

Criminal early resolution contract

LSS is pleased to announce that it's expanding the scope of criminal coverage and eligibility to a new group of clients.

Effective May 15, 2019, we'll introduce a criminal early resolution contract (CERC) where you may provide non-trial resolution services to clients who do not qualify for a criminal standard contract for representation but who are within \$1,000 per month of the standard financial eligibility threshold. Clients don't need to face a risk of jail upon conviction to be eligible for this service.

The contracts will provide you with the full range of non-trial tariff items in order to manage the case based on the client's particular issues and circumstances.

Criminal early resolution contracts will:

- include all tariff items set out in the standard criminal representation tariff except preliminary hearing and trial fees;
- include all disbursement items;
- have a 90 day stop date and a bill by date 60 days after the service stop date;
- include travel authorization where applicable; and
- be monitored for demand, and will be evaluated after one year.

LSS will begin issuing criminal early resolution contracts to lawyers on May 15, 2019.

We strongly recommend disclosing the limited nature of the contract in compliance with Chapter 3.2–1.1 of the Code of Professional Conduct for British Columbia. Provide a limited representation retainer letter to clients receiving this service.
